The estimated cost is \$8 million, which the college is financing through bonds that will be repaid from student housing fees over 30 years. Students will get private rooms in two- or four-person suites, plus an in-suite bathroom, kitchen and laundry facilities, and all the latest technological resources.

To illustrate how the future looks, the college has opened a model dorm room in its main campus building.
