### LMC Foundation makes appointments

**BENTON TOWNSHIP** — The Lake Michigan College Foundation Board of Directors elected Jeff Curry, vice president of operations at United Federal Credit Union, as president for a one-year term, effective July 1, 2014, the college announced this week.

Jim Marohn, co-owner and president of Double-day Office Products, was elected vice president of the foundation board for the same period.

### SJ Twp. to issue landfill passes

**ST. JOSEPH** — The St. Joseph Township will issue two free passes per resident for use at the Orchard Hills landfill Oct. 3-4, 10-11, 17-18, and 24-25.

Passes will be available for pickup at the Township Hall after Friday.

Users are entitled to free trips to dispose of items at Orchard Hills, off Hennessy Road in Watervliet, Township Manager Tim Fenderbosch said. He said the township spends about \$7,000 to \$8,000 per year to offer its spring and fall cleanup programs

“It’s cheaper, however, than having special pick-ups,” Fenderbosch said. “Surprisingly, it (the drive to Watervliet) doesn’t stop people. They’re pretty excited to get rid of the stuff. It’s usually bigger items – it may be a couch, it might be a book shelf that your normal yard waste (hauler) doesn’t pick up.”

### Free potassium iodide supply available

**LANSING** — The Michigan Department of Community Health is reminding those who live or work within 10 miles of a nuclear power plant and who have free potassium iodide (KI) for their emergency stockpiles to check the expiration date on their KI boxes.

Much of the potassium iodide that has been dispensed in the past few years will expire in October. Replacement KI is now available at participating pharmacies at no cost.

The department is mailing information to anyone who has obtained KI with the October expiration date. The mailing includes a voucher that should be completed and taken to a participating pharmacy to be redeemed for an updated potassium iodide supply.

Vouchers and a list of participating pharmacies are also posted at [www.michigan.gov/KI](http://www.michigan.gov/KI). Persons who have not obtained KI are encouraged to obtain it now.

In the event of a plant emergency, officials will instruct residents and businesses on primary protective measures. KI is recommended as an additional measure.
